Spring cleaning has come early this year in preparation for the Feb. 7th Gala. The library wall and both bathrooms have been repainted. The library and dining room floors are scheduled to be cleaned and buffed. New front door mats have been ordered. It is a busy time trying to coordinate everything.

Many thanks to Terry Markey who has cleaned the library and dining room furniture, Jean Nolan and the volunteers from South Tech who have cleaned the library windows and other areas.

I found a book on the life and art of Bernard P.Thomas while cleaning the office. I always assumed he was a south Florida muralist but after reading about his life and work, have a newfound respect for the mural in our dining room.

He was born and raised in Sheridan, Wyoming, studied art in

Paris and moved to Boynton Beach in 1953 where he lived until his death in 1994 at age 76. He is noted for his western art and documentary murals, most which is in private collections today.

He taught art classes at our building and the stage mural was painted by his art students in the early 1960s. He painted the mural for our club. The only other local public painting is a religious painting called "After the Last

Supper" which hangs at the First United Methodist Church In Boynton Beach. His wife, Betty, was a long-time member of our club and has a park in Boynton Beach dedicated to her. She and their daughter were at our 100th anniversary open house.

The building is full of history and priceless items that can never be replaced and we have a tremendous responsibility to protect what has been entrusted to us.
